OUR MEMBERSHIP

From Membership Year 2021 - 2022

In 2021, Girl Scouts of California's Central Coast (GSCCC) combined girl and adult membership reached over 8,000 with an overall retention rate of 78.5%.

Girl Scouts is the first and largest girl-led organization in the world, and for over a century has been preparing girls in grades K-12 for everyday leadership by providing experiences to explore new interests, face challenges, form new friendships, and make lasting community contributions.

Our programs encompass four pillars: Life Skills, STEM, the Outdoors, and Entrepreneurship to deliver girl-led activities to girls across six counties along California's Central Coast.

POWERING OPPORTUNITIES FOR GIRLS

Each year, our communities come together in support of the work of the council, and more importantly to help girls learn what it means to actually lead a business by participating in the Fall Program Sale and the annual Girl Scout Cookie Sale Program.

A century ago, girls started participating in what would evolve into the largest entrepreneurial training program for girls in the world, the Girl Scout Cookie Program. Selling Girl Scout Cookies not only helps Girl Scouts earn money for fun, educational activities and community projects, but also plays a huge role in guiding girls to discover their inner go-getter,

innovator, risk-taker, and leader as they learn five essential life skills that will stay with them throughout their lives. All of the net revenue raised through the Girl Scout Cookie Program—100 percent of it—stays with the council and troops.

The annual nut and candy and magazine sale program held each fall is bursting with fun, digital avatars and learning, and serves as an important troop start-up opportunity to fuel fall program activities. In 2021, 43% of troops participated and received over \$120K in profits from selling nuts, candy, and magazines.

Over 3,000 girls attended Camp Arnaz programs - the council's beautiful 36-acre camp property located on the outskirts of Ventura

We had another successful year of incredible Summer Day Camps held by Service Units across the council with a variety of fun themes to provide hundreds of girls a fun, active week in the outdoors.

Through our Programs, Camps, and Training, we provided over 1,858 girls with outdoor experiences across our Council. Girls explored hiking, backpacking, wildlife, and outdoor skills in all counties.

We held in-person and virtual programs across our council with all four Program Pillars being engaged: STEM, Entrepreneurship, Life Skills, and Outdoors.

Honoring the women of excellence who are lighting the way for our future leaders.



HOLLY NISHIDA

Holly Nishida's initial involvement with Girl Scouts began as a Girl Scout, for the first eleven years. Upon graduating from high school, Holly participated in the Campus Gold and Young Adults programs which allowed her to continue to be involved with the council. In her late 20's, she took on the role of trainer where she felt she had found her true calling. Holly found great joy in shepherding new leaders from a fledgling state to a level of profound confidence in their abilities to lead their troops and has continued to work as a trainer and has since earned the title of Master Trainer. Holly has also been a longtime volunteer of the bi-annual campout, Kaleidoscope, where she has participated as a judge and as a director over the years. Girl Scouts has been a central part of her entire life. She states that it has shaped her into the woman she is today, and she feels so strongly about offering the same opportunities to as many girls as possible.



CHARLENE GARFINKLE

Charlene Garfinkle has been involved with Girl Scouts since 2001, when she became the leader of a Brownie troop. Charlene soon took on several volunteer roles for the Costa de Oro Service Unit, Tres Condados Council, and Girl Scouts of California's Central Coast Council. She led her daughter through the Bronze, Silver, and Gold Awards. Charlene is a Lifetime Girl Scout who has received the Green Angel award, Appreciation Pin, Honor Pin, and Thanks Badge and is now being honored as a GSCCC Woman of Distinction. A woman of the arts, Charlene made the move to Santa Barbara to enter the graduate program in the History of Art at UCSB, receiving a Master's in 1986 and a Ph.D. in 1996. She has taught for SBCC and UCSB and held a variety of volunteer positions for art history organizations. She credits following the Girl Scout Promise and Law in all aspects of life for inspiring her to be a better wife and mother, a better friend, a better citizen, a better person, and there is no better impact on her life than that.



ANN PADDEN-RUBIN

Ann Padden Rubin is celebrating her 45th year of Girl Scouting. This lifetime of developing girls began with amazing troop leaders who expanded her horizons through badges, international travel, leadership, and service. Ann received her Silver and Gold Awards as a scout herself, was a Girl Scout camp counselor, and has been leading scout troops continuously since college. She encourages women with and without children to become troop leaders. As cookie cupboard for the Costa de Oro Service Unit for nearly a decade, 400,000 boxes of cookies have traveled through her back yard. You may have met Ann at Kaleidoscope as an attendee, cookoff chair, and 2024 food coordinator. Ann's community leadership has included being an elementary teacher in Boston and in Santa Barbara, a church leader, and board member of the Anacapa School. During the pandemic in response to food scarcity concerns, she organized and fundraised River of Giving in coordination with Promotors Network and distributed 1,000 family grocery boxes. Ann's other charitable activities include fighting human trafficking of women and girls, improving fair trade, and promoting conservation and sustainability. Ann's favorite Girl Scout tradition is singing camp songs. She loves teaching others these songs and has attending the Washington DC Singalong on her bucket list.





DEBI DYER

Debi Dyer descends from a long line of Girl Scout alums, and despite never having been a Girl Scout herself, has gone on to raise two of her own and dedicated 18 years of exceptional volunteer work to the organization. She has served in every position with the Rancho Sierra Service Unit team, as Manager for 3 years in Newbury Park serving 52 troops and 500+ members. She became a Trainer in 2007, during this time she taught almost every course offered, organized Leaderamas, and served as a judge for 3 Kaleidoscope events. Debi has been a recipient of many prestigious GSUSA awards, including an Appreciation Pin, an Honor Pin, a Thanks Badge, and both Leader and Volunteer Appreciation Pins. During her time with Girl Scouts, she has provided invaluable insight on updates to manuals, forms, and improved processes with many Council staff members. As recently as 2021, Debi assisted the Thousand Oaks Service Unit during a lull in leadership. During this year, she provided courses to 57 adults and 22 youth, helped with fundraising, and fostered troop involvement. She served the Council for Cookie Rallies, the Adult Awards committee and served on the Membership Connection Committee. Debi currently resides in Newbury Park with her husband of 25 years, Kevin.



EMMA VETTER

Having been involved with Girl Scouts for 25 years, Emma Vetter knows what it means to make the world a better place. Her first experience with Girl Scouts began at the Girl Scouts of Greater New York Council, where she spent 12 years going through the grade levels of Brownie to Senior, which was the highest level at the time. She received the prestigious Gold Award in 1990. Emma has been a Girl Scout leader for the last 13 years where she leads a multi-level troop, continuing her Girl Scout journey. Some of the roles that she has held in the council include Service Unit Registrar, SU Manager, and current SU Treasurer and SU Fall Product and Cookie Sales Coordinator. Emma has also been actively volunteering with Toro Park Summer Day Camp the last five years. In 2015, her troop went to Kaleidoscope for the first time, and it was a great experience to be with so many of their Girl Scout Sisters from all over the council. That experience led the troop to go down again in 2019 and 2022. Emma is now volunteering with the amazing Kaleidoscope team. Emma has resided in Monterey for the past 19 years. She has a B.A. in Biology and Anthropology and an M.A. in Anthropology. She is forever grateful for the memories, experiences, and friendships that she gained through Girl Scouts. She feels that she receives far more than what she gives; she sees this in herself, her daughters, and her girls - their leadership, confidence, and courage that they have all gained through Girl Scouts.



SARAH BROWNLEE

Sarah Brownlee's journey with Girl Scouts started in 2010 when her daughter was only six years old. She brought home a flyer from school and said with joy, "I want to do this for the rest of my life!" When her daughter bridged to Brownies, Sarah took over as troop leader and really dove into the role. Last year, Sarah graduated six of her girls from that same troop. Her troop currently has four Ambassadors who will graduate this year and next year. In 2014, Sarah became a Service Unit Manager for Santa Maria. There, she worked hard to grow their service unit. Eventually in 2019, she worked with the neighboring service unit to merge their two small service units. In 2016-17 she worked with Lisa Dart in order to begin Camp Athena, an outdoor backpacking resident camp in the central area. Athena continued for four years until the pandemic put a halt to it. Sarah and her team are currently working to get Camp Athena running again. Today, Sarah is on the committee for a day camp and she's also the PA director for the camp. In the fall of 2021, she began her time on the Kaleidoscope committee. Sarah also took her Ambassadors and Juniors to Kaleidoscope in 2022, where they were able to meet other Girl Scouts from across the council.
