



# OUR MEMBERSHIP

From Membership Year 2020 - 2021

In 2021, Girl Scouts of California's Central Coast (GSCCC) combined girl and adult membership reached over 8,000 with an overall retention rate of 65%.

**TOTAL GIRL MEMBERSHIP** 5,631

Girl Scouts is the first and largest girl-led organization in the world, and for over a century has been preparing girls in grades K-12 for everyday leadership by providing experiences to explore new interests, face challenges, form new friendships, and make lasting community contributions.

**TOTAL ADULT MEMBERSHIP** 3,006

Our programs encompass four pillars: Life Skills, STEM, the Outdoors, and Entrepreneurship to deliver girl-led activities to girls across six counties along California's Central Coast.

**GIRL RETENTION** 63%

## POWERING OPPORTUNITIES FOR GIRLS

Each year, our communities come together in support of the work of the council, and more importantly to help girls learn what it means to actually lead a business by participating in the Fall Program Sale and the annual Girl Scout Cookie Sale Program.

A century ago, girls started participating in what would evolve into the largest entrepreneurial training program for girls in the world, the Girl Scout Cookie Program. Selling Girl Scout Cookies not only helps Girl Scouts earn money for fun, educational activities and community projects, but also plays a huge role in guiding girls to discover their inner go-getter,

innovator, risk-taker, and leader as they learn five essential life skills that will stay with them throughout their lives. All of the net revenue raised through the Girl Scout Cookie Program—100 percent of it—stays with the council and troops.

The annual nut and candy and magazine sale program held each fall is laced with fun, digital avatars and learning, and serves as an important troop start-up opportunity to fuel fall program activities. In 2020, 346 troops received over \$100K in profits from selling nuts, candy, and magazines.



# OUTDOOR ADVENTURES

## CAMPS & CLUBS

The Arnaz Program Center is nestled into the scenic lower Ojai Valley on 36-acres. The property serves as a platform for different age-level troops to engage in outdoor education, place-based learning and environmental education through a variety of activities that reflect the interests and needs of the girls and the skills and abilities of the adults who support them.

Since its dedication in November of 1982, thousands of Girl Scouts, non-profit organizations, and private parties have enjoyed the beauty and enrichment of programs and outdoor events at the Arnaz Program Center.

There are two cabins and a lodge on site, providing room for a variety of program events and overnight accommodations. Each building has electricity, hot water, cooking facilities and flush toilets. Arnaz also boasts two comfortable campgrounds and five rain shines (permanent rain canopies) with individual fire pits, cooking areas, picnic tables, running water, small grills and campfire rings. At camp, you'll also find two yurts that can accommodate 25 people for a meeting or other activity.

Camp Arnaz has four new Centers as of March 2021: the Bullock's Archery Range, the BB Gun Range, the Ruth Pollack Astronomy Center, and the Equine Center. Members, their families, and non-members can currently purchase a Club Pass for exclusive access to any of the following clubs: Archery Club, BB Gun Shooting Club, Astronomy Club. The All-Access Pass grants access to all three areas. Girl Scout members 13 and older can also join the Rancheras at Camp Arnaz which uses the Equine Center.

The Camp Arnaz Equine Center's Mission unites Girl Scouts and horses to create opportunities for outdoor adventure and meaningful relationships. 

# 2022 WOMEN OF DISTINCTION

Honoring the women of excellence who are lighting the way for our future leaders.



## KRISTIN ESCALLE

Kristin Escalle is the Service Unit Manager in San Luis Obispo, CA. She was born and raised in Sparks, NV where she was a Girl Scout for six years. She fondly remembers those years camping, hiking, volunteering, crafting, playing, and making new friends.

After high school, Kristin attended the University of Nevada, Las Vegas where she earned a degree in International Business. She started working for Ferguson after college and has spent the last twenty-two years working there.

Since moving to San Luis Obispo eight years ago, Kristin was quickly re-introduced to Girl Scouts when her daughter started first grade. She became a co-leader of the troop in 2014, held the SU Cookie Chair position for six years, serves as cookie chair for her troop, and became the Service Unit Manager five years ago. In her time with GSCCC, Kristin has also co-chaired three Day Camps and organized Girl Scout participation in the SLO Annual Holiday Parade.



## BETTE GRACE

Bette Grace is a Certified Public Accountant, who with her husband Mike owns and operates Grace CPAs, LLP, a public accounting firm. Bette also holds a number of other professional designations including Certified Fraud Examiner, and advisor services through SagePoint Financial.

Bette became interested in Girl Scouts when she joined as a Brownie, many years ago. She loved all that Girl Scouting offered, and was a cookie mom for her daughter's troop years ago. When her granddaughter Caitlin was old enough, Bette found herself back in Scouting.

She has served as troop leader or co-leader for eleven years for Caitlin's troop, serves as Service Unit 250 Treasurer and Day Camp Director, and is honored to serve on the Girl Scouts of California's Central Coast's board of directors.



## SHARON HALL

Sharon's Girl Scout journey began as a Brownie in Okinawa. She continued with her Girl Scouting through high school and earned her Gold Award in 1981 in San Antonio, TX on a project with the Children's Association for Maximum Potential (CAMP), an organization dedicated to providing recreation, respite, and education for children with special needs and those who care for them. She also volunteered through her college years with Girl Scouts as an Arts and Crafts Director at KIDS (Kids With Individual Differences) Camp.

Sharon continues serving Girl Scouts mission as a leader in her community. She has been an active volunteer with GSCCC since 2007 as a Troop Volunteer, a Troop Leader, and a Service Unit Manager. Today, Sharon is a Learning Facilitator and represents her Service Unit on the Membership Connection Committee.

Outside of her community service work, Sharon has 30 years' experience in pharmaceuticals and biotechnology regulatory affairs and clinical research. She currently serves as Vice President of Regulatory at Allay Therapeutics, Inc.



## EILEEN MURTA

Eileen was born and raised in Los Angeles County. During her junior and senior high school years she was active in the Youth Fellowship at local Methodist Church which had strong camping and work team programs. After graduating from Hoover High School Eileen attended Glendale Junior College, earning an AA degree, and then transferred to Cal State Los Angeles where she earned a Bachelor of Science in nursing.

After university, Eileen became active in her local Methodist Church. She traveled all over California leading the church's Junior High Youth Group and starting a Young Adult Weekly Dinner program while working part-time as a nurse. It was in Santa Maria that Eileen discovered her preferred field of nursing: cardiac rehabilitation. Inspired by this interest, Eileen became a founding member of a Mended Hearts Chapter. It was also in Santa Maria when her daughters joined Girl Scouts that Eileen became a Girl Scout leader.

In 2013, Eileen retired to Los Osos where she volunteers for the Cardiac Rehab at French Hospital. At the Methodist Church, she took charge of the Food Pantry program and in Girl Scouts she became the Estero Pines Service Unit Manager, a Learning Facilitator, and a member of the Kaleidoscope Steering Committee. Currently, Eileen also serves as the Assistant Regional Director for the Mended Hearts chapters on the Central Coast.



## HAZEL POWELL

Hazel was introduced to Girl Scouts in second grade when her mother formed a Brownie Girl Scout Troop. Through Girl Scouts, Hazel visited with Girl Guides in the Okanagan Valley in British Columbia, traveled up the Inland Passage off the coast of Alaska, and represented Girl Scouts of San Francisco Bay Area at the 1962 Roundup in Vermont. Influenced by her Girl Scout experiences, Hazel became the girl representative on the Girl Scout San Francisco Bay Area Planning Council.

After many years as a junior high school teacher in Santa Cruz, Hazel retired and continued working with Girl Scouts to be a trainer of new leaders with the Consortium of Girl Scout Learning Facilitators, working at day camps, and serving on the Gold Award Mentor Committee.

Hazel is also a longtime member of Delta Kappa Gamma (DKG), International, a women teachers' society studying California state legislation affecting women, children, and education. There she volunteers as a legislative coordinator and organizes Legislative Study Sessions for DKG members in Sacramento. Hazel is also a member of UC Santa Cruz Campus and Community Connections which raises money for re-entry students to attend the University of California.



## LA TANYA WILSON

La Tanya has been in Girl Scouts for over 30 years. She joined Girl Scouts in the fourth grade and although she didn't have the money for the entire uniform, her mother made her the skirt and green camping pants.

Twenty years ago, when La Tanya's daughter was in fourth grade, she reignited her service in Girl Scouts and became a Troop Leader. However, she has held many other volunteer positions in the troop and service unit as well. Troop Leader, Treasurer, Older Girl Program Coordinator, Travel Coordinator, Encampment Coordinator, and Wilderness Trainer are just a few of the titles she's held.

Outside of Girl Scouts, La Tanya is a retired Air Force Lt Col. She currently works at the California State University Monterey Bay as an Administrative Support Coordinator for the College of Education. She holds a Master of Arts in International Affairs with a concentration in Middle Eastern Affairs (Persian Gulf) from California State University Sacramento and a Bachelor of Arts in English from Norfolk State University.
