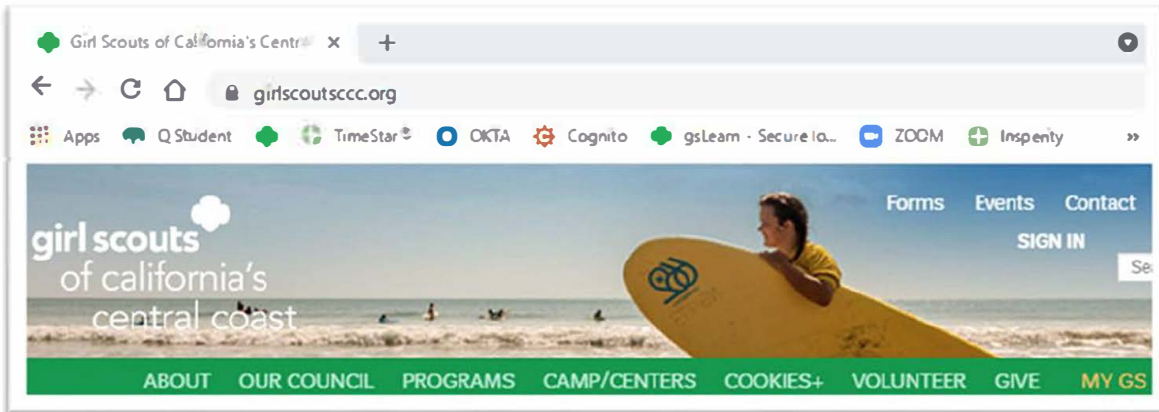
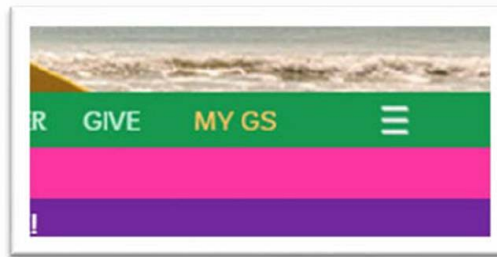


How to log into gsLearn

Step 1 – go to girlscoutscoc.org



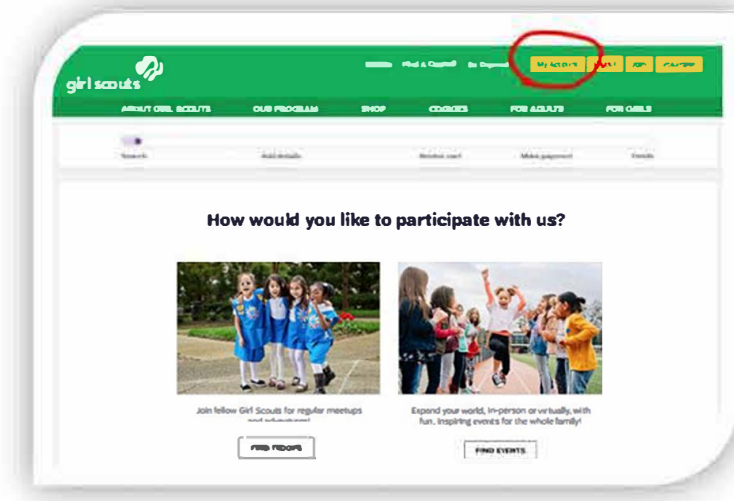
Step 2 – Select MY GS



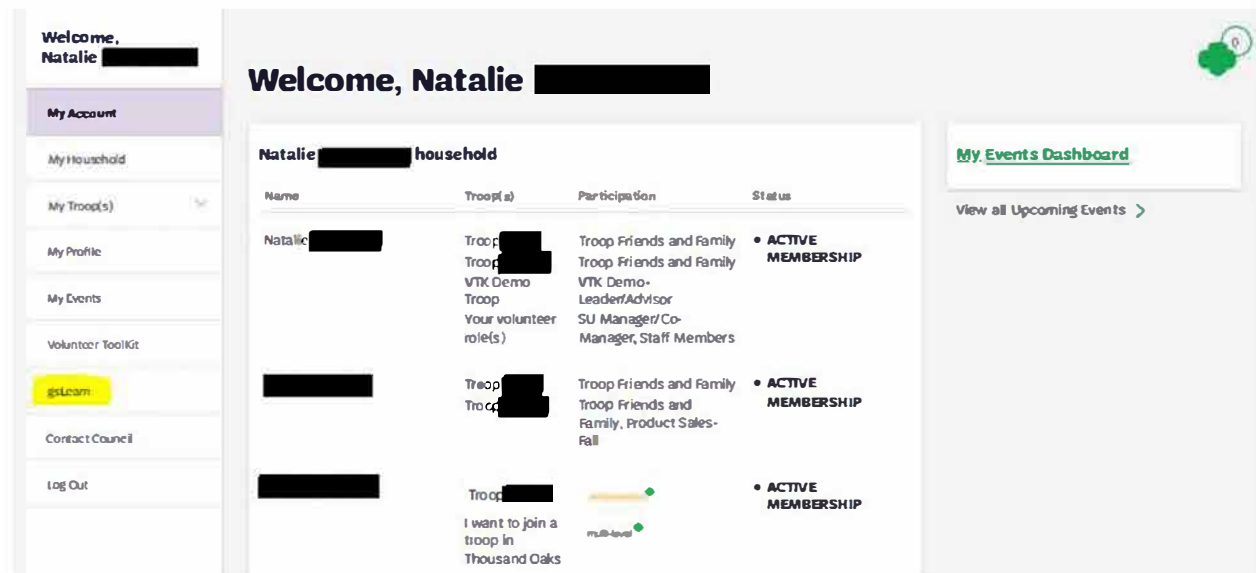
Step 3 – Log in to your account or create an account.
