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Girl Scouts of California's Central Coast launched an "Infant at Work" program last August that allows parents to bring their infant to work for up to six months. Also, as a mother/parent we want to be there for all if not as many milestones as possible, so bringing him to work with me allows me to have those milestones and memories." Baby Jayde also joined her mom Kayla McKee (Program Specialist) earlier this month. McKee says, "My experience with her has been good as a whole, there are definitely challenges but it's very worth it." Meanwhile, Lindsey Hatlee (Director of Program) reports our first graduate, Sean Hatlee, is doing well.

"This program shows that the council's practices are what we encourage in our communities; supporting parent and infant bonding, parental well-being, healthy infant development, and breastfeeding," said Helmuth. Parents have the opportunity to



respond to their infant's needs instantly, which will boost their cognitive development. Bonding is a process on its own, it is not something that occurs overnight, it must be nurtured and built up as time goes on. The "Infant at Work" program supports all facets of infant development. This program is invaluable for both parents and infants alike.
