Girl Scouts of California's Central Coast is pleased to announce that Kaleidoscope, a camporee for Junior, Cadette, Senior and Ambassador Girl Scouts (grades 4 – 12), returned for a weekend full of tent camping, skill challenges, workshops, SWAPS, songs, games, a Cook-off, Saturday evening program, and an All-camp Service Project. The event, which occurs every other year, was held once again after being put on hold in 2021 due to COVID-19. Girls and adults gathered in Santa Barbara County this past weekend for fun-filled times with their sister Girl Scouts. This year's theme was "Force of the Future."

Leading up to this highly anticipated weekend, troops plan and practice their outdoor skills for months in preparation. Girl Scouts brought SWAPS (small keepsakes for exchanging with new friends) to trade with one another and decorate their hats, lanyards, and vests. In addition to traditional Girl Scout camp activities such as Flag Ceremonies and SWAPS, girls participated in skills challenges and workshops including fire-building, lashing, knot-tying, orienteering, and Dutch Oven one-pot cooking.

The girls arrived Friday afternoon with camping equipment, to set up camp. Once settled in, they enjoyed an outdoor movie before lights out.

Girls formed "patrols" in order to participate in various skills challenges. These included Camping, Compass and Map Reading, Fire Building, First Aid, Flag Ceremony, Kim's Game, Knots, Lashing, Campsite Management, and Survival, each of which earned patrols points towards a goal. This year's All Camp Service Project gave the girls the opportunity to make a handmade blanket or quilt to give to a child in need through Project Linus. This project was open to girls of all ages and the troop's blankets were displayed at the event. They also took part in "just for fun" competitions within villages against other teams or troops, where there



was one winner in each category. These competitions awarded troops for best banners, campsite decorations, and creative hats.

Workshops were also offered as a large part of Saturday's activities, which included crafts, skills, cooking, songs, and games. As the girls picked up their dinners and found their seats, they donned their glow necklaces as the Saturday evening program began which was full of songs and skits performed by fellow Girl Scouts. They participated in evening star gazing before heading off to bed.

Sunday morning from 9:30 a.m. – 12:00 p.m., a Cook-off competition ensued where girls were able to show off their camp cooking skills (without the help of any adults). Judges observed as girls prepared the food and built their fires, cooked their dishes, presented them to the tasting judges, doused the fires and cleaned up their stations. Teams were evaluated based on their teamwork, sanitation skills, and ability to work safely. The final food products were then ranked by taste appearance, for which the top three teams were awarded in each category.

Cook-Off categories were broken up into various methods of camp cooking, including the Dutch Oven, foil pouch, box oven, and camp stove. Girls were able to create complete meals with a protein, a starch, and a vegetable, desserts, and baked goods.

After a weekend full of fun, Girl Scouts cleaned up their respective camp villages before heading back home.

This event wouldn't have been possible without the help of our phenomenal volunteers that dedicated their time as Village Hosts, Skills Challenge and Just for Fun Judges, Workshop Leaders, Security, First Aid Providers, Food Prep Assistants, and our Set-Up/Take-Down Crew.
