

Girl Scouts of California's Central Coast Equali-Tea Patch Program

Must be completed by November 30, 2020

The suffrage (right to vote) movement was unique in that it was the first time; women across the nation became politically active on women's right. These female activists, called Suffragettes protested their right to vote with marches, letters and articles in local papers, and were often arrested while participating in these activities.

Tea had traditionally been a way for women to socialize and organize. Suffragettes used tea parties as a way to educate others and plan protest activities. These teas began to be called Equali-Teas.

This patch program aligns with GSUSA's Democracy badges at every level.

Discover!

Pick three (3) of the following Discover activities:

- Learn what the word "suffrage" means and its origin. What does it mean for girls and women in today's society?
- Watch the 2015 movie Suffragette, PG-13.
- Learn about civil disobedience. What does it mean? How does it help make change?
- Explore the history of voting rights in the United States of America. Did all women get to vote after the 19th Amendment passed? If not why?
- Learn about the National Association of Colored Women (NACW) at https://www.nacwc.com/. NACW was founded in 1896. How did this organization support the Suffragette Movement?
- Discover the difference between voting in person, absentee voting and mail-in voting.
- Discover where and how to register to vote, and the eligibility requirements to do so.

- Interview a female, 65 or older, about their first voting experience. Has she been an active voter since then? Why or why not?
