
To continually improve our organization and the services we provide throughout the central coast, we implemented GSUSA's Network Alignment Strategy through the Volunteer Engagement Initiative (VEI) in 2016. Staff directly serving volunteers gained specialized responsibilities to allow them to better focus on recruitment, volunteer support, and training. Additionally, we developed a Customer Care solutions team to provide responses within 24 hours. The launch of our new mobile responsive web platform also made it easier for members to register and onboard to form a troop.

Girl Scouts of California's Central Coast also hosted a successful National Product Sales Conference in Ventura for all councils; held donor appreciation events; hosted the second annual Fork It Over fundraiser to benefit Camp Arnaz and stewarded a successful fundraising campaign to transform the Castroville office into a tri-county leadership center for girls and volunteers who serve them.

At the center of it all, were our volunteers, community partners and donors who are the heartbeat of making Girl Scout programs, camp, activities, and even dreams, come true! MEMBERSHIP

In 2016, Girl Scouts of California's Central Coast (GSCCC) combined girl and adult membership reached 16,103 with retention above the national average for councils. We introduced new girls to Girl Scouts through extensive grant-supported outreach programs in local communities. Additional collaborations with a variety of military, civic and corporate organizations allowed GSCCC to reach more girls furthering the mission of developing girls of courage, confidence, and character, who make the world a better place.

The benefits of membership are time-tested and backed by research which shows that girls gain: strong sense of self, positive values, ability to take appropriate risks to challenge herself, healthy relationships and the experience of taking action in her community – all while having fun!

With our passion to ensure that girls get this chance to do more and experience more, Parent Information Nights, Build-a-Troop, Girl's Night Out and community events were continually held throughout the central coast. Events were free and gave hundreds of girls and their families the opportunity to learn about various Girl Scout programs from outdoor activities to building robots to camping and playing sports.





PROGRAM

HELPING HER DISCOVER THE #POWEROFGIRL

Girl Scouts of California's Central Coast provides fun, innovative experiences that inspire and challenge girls to gain skills they need to empower themselves for life. Girls get to share these moments together by making friendships that last forever. At the center of every Girl Scout program, is the opportunity for hands-on activities designed for the girl's age-level giving her a chance to discover interests and connect with others for action as part of the Girl Scout Leadership Experience (GSLE). Skilled program staff and thousands of volunteers supported the activities of 10,483 girls during 2015-2016.

Moving at the speed of girls

Dedicated to ensuring a relevant experience, GSCCC offered a number of Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) based programs that gave exposure to digital and tech opportunities from Digital Movie Making to Digital Online Cookie apps and more. Girls also explored the science and technology of operating the United States Naval Ship the *U.S. Mercy* during a tour of this massive floating hospital which provides for humanitarian service. Girls in tenth through twelfth grade had an opportunity to tour SpaceX Headquarters to learn about how the company plans to revolutionize space technology. In its second year, girls were able to dive-deep to witness underwater seamounts and a purple orb which made international news first-hand with the *E.V. Nautilus* expedition as it toured the oceans off the central coast.


Outdoors and caring for the environment

Backpacking basics and wilderness skills workshops were a huge hit providing safety and practical survival with wild edibles and useful plants. In partnership with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, U.S. Navy Seabees, and the Audubon Society, girls also worked with wildlife biologists and engaged in a long-term project building and launching floating nests for the endangered California Clapper Rail. A creek defender, and Monarch monitoring program gave girls the opportunity to protect native species. An online water conservation program sponsored by AMGEN Foundation gave girls great materials to learn more about their natural resources.



Camp life is the best life

It wouldn't be Girl Scouts without the rich tradition of camp. In 2016, **2,485 campers** participated in Girl Scout programs and overnights held at the Arnaz Program Center—the council's 36-acre camp property on the outskirts of Ventura. Camp Artemis, a very popular outdoor leadership camp ran by-girls-for-girls, was again held in the Santa Cruz mountains with **272 girl campers!** Volunteer day camps were held throughout the central coast and ranged in theme from Girls Gone Mad! (Scientists) to Oceans of Fun and Rock & Roll. In partnership with the National Association of Women in Construction (NAWIC), construction day camp was held at Arnaz where **22 girls** in pink hardhats built a trivet and used large power tools. An additional **120 girls** enjoyed Camp Natoma, a traditional overnight summer camp located between San Luis Obispo and Paso Robles. At Camp Natoma, Girl Scouts slept under the stars and had the opportunity to participate in outdoor activities including archery, swimming, hiking, arts and crafts, music, nature exploration and more!

POWERED BY THE GIRL SCOUT COOKIE PROGRAM

Girl Scouts of California's Central Coast hosted the 2016 National GSUSA Product Sales Conference at the Ventura Beach Marriott in June. Over 200 participants representing Girl Scout councils and vendors from across the country attended. The annual conference is paramount to executing this important annual financial literacy and money earning program as much of what girls do in Girl Scouting is powered by the cookie sale.

With the dedicated support of families, leaders, cookie chairs, and community supporters, girls learned the essential skills they need to become effective leaders. They managed finances, gained self-sufficiency, and developed confidence in handling money by learning the 5 Skills as an outcome of the Girl Scout Cookie Program, and the council was sustained to provide volunteer support and training, maintain properties and more.

GSCCC also held a fall sale for troops to earn additional funds. In 2015, 485 troops, with 2,745 girls participating, had nut and candy sales of \$613,932 and magazine sales of \$139,119 for total troop profit of \$134,966.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Fundamental to the mission of Girl Scouting is providing access to as many girls as possible because when girls succeed, so does society. With generous grants and contributions from foundations, corporations, civic organizations and many individuals, the Council extended our reach beyond traditional troops to touch the lives of 1,605 girls with the benefits of the Girl Scout Leadership Experience.

In 2016, 193 campers learned solar cooking, knots, fire making, archery, wilderness shelter and first aid thanks to a continued partnership with United Way of Santa Barbara, where GSCCC hosted a week of FITS (FUN IN THE SUN) at GSCCC's Camp Arnaz Program Center. Campers ages 8-17 came from five United Way sites including Westside Santa Barbara, Goleta, Eastside Santa Barbara and Carpinteria—for this outdoor survival skills experience.

More than 30 all-girl soccer teams, ages 5 to 14, took part in Girl Scouts Soccer Series Journey by competing in a friendly and fun athletic event that encouraged healthy exercise and leadership for girls in Monterey County.

GSCCC's Alisal Program Center (APC) in Salinas partnered with California State University Monterey Bay in 2016 where students aided girls in the center each week and received credit for volunteering in the community. The APC provides daily enrichment programs: STEM on Mondays, Girl Scout Patches on Tuesdays, Arts/Crafts/Cooking on Wednesdays, Physical Fitness on Thursdays and Fun on Fridays! The APC also offers girls homework help, safe outdoor play, and Girl Scout troop activities year-round. Made possible by generous community supporters, 78 girls attended the Alisal Program Center during 2016 to have a nurturing place to learn early leadership skills and healthy habits.

ADULT TRAINING


Serving communities throughout the central coast are 29 volunteer Service Units who form the network of supporting Girl Scout Leaders. As these dedicated adults partner with girls to guide and inspire growth and achievement, new leader orientation, specialized training and continual development are an essential service of the Council. In 2016, 400 new volunteers were provided a progression of trainings to lead troops, promote safety, plan outdoor activities, manage troop finances, the cookie business and more.

Whether it's earning one of the national proficiency badges like Digital Photographer, or embarking on a primitive camping trip to one of the National Parks in our Council, GSCCC provides volunteers with specialized training to inspire and support girls' adventures. And in 2016, we offered volunteers and parents tools to inspire and stimulate girls' curiosity in STE[A]M (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math) during a fun Adult Training Open House in May at the Arnaz Program Center.

CENTENNIAL OF THE GOLD AWARD


This year marked the centennial of the highest award a girl can earn in Girl Scouts—the Girl Scout Gold Award. Girl Scouts of California’s Central Coast (GSCCC) celebrated 100 Years of Changing the World on Capitol Hill in Washington, D.C. and in Sacramento, California. GSCCC’s Annual Meeting also celebrated this milestone and acknowledged generations of girls and women who had earned the award, or its predecessor award.

Sacramento Women’s Caucus Event
